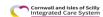


## **Driving and Dementia**



## Dementia and Driving Dr Allison Hibbert



- · Fear for many people is loss of driving license
- · Huge issue in in rural areas
- Dementia diagnosis is not in itself a reason to stop driving
- · Main issue is whether the person is safe
- However over time dementia affects driving skills focus, attention, problem solving, judgement, reaction, memory, calmness.
- Think about other co-morbidities as well sight, head-turning, strength, medications
- If a person wants to keep driving they must let DVLA of the diagnosis and insurance straight away failure £1000 fine and insurance cover void
- · DVLA will ask for medical info and send person a questionnaire

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- As doctors if obviously unsafe then advice is to stop, if unsure we can advise stopping and DVLA will require further tests before the person can drive.
- If a person wants to stop then they send license back to DVLA – voluntary surrender
- DVLA will gather info –they will either recommend they can drive (issue license for 1-3 years), advice to stop driving or ask for driving assessment
